Begin by understanding the basic rules, formulas and concepts of the selected topic before moving to intensive question practice.

Start with questions related to the recently studied topic and focus on accuracy before attempting to increase speed.

3 **Attempt Timed Tests**

Introduce timed practice gradually so that solving speed and decision making improve without compromising accuracy.

4 **Analyse Mistakes**

Review incorrect answers and difficult questions. Identify the reason behind each mistake and revise the relevant concept.

Make Practice More Effective

Quality is as important as quantity during exam preparation. Solving hundreds of questions without reviewing mistakes may provide limited improvement. A better approach is to maintain a simple error notebook containing formulas, concepts, question types and mistakes that require repeated attention. Revisiting this information during weekly revision can prevent the same errors from becoming a habit. Students should also gradually increase the difficulty and time pressure of practice as their fundamentals become stronger.
